

visors, and Staff Advisors, in Colorado this summer. There were many new and positive programs introduced. Some of these will be put into effect immediately while others will be implemented over the course of several years. In addition to describing these in our publications we will be discussing them at training sessions and at special sessions at our weekends. When Stephen Brown and I attended the National Leadership Summit, we were introduced to many new programs that National is implementing for the OA. First, the Troop Representative Program promises to be a major success. This program will be used to keep brothers up to date about the lodge by communicating on the troop level. This program will be implemented by coordinating with the TR Chairman, his liaisons, and the Troop Representatives. This program promises to boost attendance, promote brotherhood conversion, and bring back old members.

During my tenure as Lodge Vice-Chief, I will focus my efforts on cheerful service at the Chapter levels. A quality chapter in our lodge should be able to accomplish the following goals:

 Chapter Chiefs should call all of the members of their chapter before each event to let them know what's going on at the weekends. This will boost attendance at the weekends and bring old faces back.

- 2. Chapter Chiefs should visit 75% of the troops in their area before January 31st to promote scout camping and weekend events, as well as visiting local packs to promote Cub Scout camping.
- 3. Chapters should hold quarterly chapter meetings to discuss events, chapter service, membership turnout at weekend events, and other necessities.
- 4. Have at least 75% of chapter members participate in Chapter service projects lasting a total of at least 8 hours.

Of course, this does require a lot of work from the Chapter Chiefs, but that's not to say that it can't be done.

We will have better attendance at weekends, and there will be a better bond between Chapter Members.

I believe this will be an awesome year for our lodge.




SECRETARY'S REPORT FROM RANDY WERTEPNY

NATIONAL ORDER OF THE ARROW CONFERENCE

NOAC is **the** national gathering for the Order of the Arrow. Arrowmen from all over the country come together and have a great time on a beautiful college campus. Arrowmen stay in dorms, eat in the cafeterias and have a blast attending the events throughout the campus. No matter if this is your first NOAC or you are a veteran conference attendee, there will be something new there to do along with many old favorites.

A key part of NOAC is sharing knowledge and learning new ideas. One of the best ways to learn at NOAC is through the formal training sessions that take place.

This is a chance for Arrowmen to share new ideas and suggestions of some of the best trainers in the country. They present sessions on various topics that range from being an efficient officer to the meaning of the customs and traditions of the Order of the Arrow. Another way to get important ideas are through demonstrations, workshops and talking to other Arrowmen. Although more informal, this way of learning can be just as fun. and workshops, as well as chances for lodges with individuals interested in American Indian dancing and singing a chance to perform for a panel of judges. During Founders Day, there is usually a Pow-Wow in which the American Indian Events participants are encouraged to take part. There is a dazzling array of regalia and talent.

Ceremonies have also been a part of NOAC for many years. Lodges can enter teams in Ordeal, Brotherhood, and Vigil evaluations. Judges give recommendations on how the team can become better. The goal of this type of competition is for the participants to become better through the evaluation. The participants have put a lot of time and effort into practicing and it is incredible to watch them. Seeing other teams gives lodges ideas on what they would like their own teams to be like. Those interested in ceremonies can also attend training sessions on all aspects of our ceremonies.

Another set of exciting events are the sports and competitions. These activities give those lodges who are willing to sweat and have some fun a chance to take home a trophy in basketball, volleyball, or a ton of others events. If you are the type of person who prefers a less physical approach, OA Jeopardy can challenge your mind. Also, patch trading can be very fulfilling. There is a sense of fascination watching some of the patch trading experts in action.

All the lodges that attend have patches that are unique and very well designed. Not only is it fun to see all of the different designs from the various lodges, but patch trading is a great fellowship opportunity. Don't pass up an opportunity to take part in the fun.

Founders Day is a day at NOAC where the original founders of Order of the Arrow are celebrated. A Midway is set up and lodges do all kinds of displays and activities. NOAC 2000 is scheduled to take place from Saturday, July 29 through Thursday


breakfast, August 3 on the beautiful campus of the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. Approximately 6800 members are expected to attend or staff the Conference. National OA Committeeman Matt Walker has been appointed to head up the conference.

This will be our third conference at UT. Program will be planned under the leadership of the officers attending the national planning meeting in December of 1999. If you have any ideas or suggestions write them up and get them to your Section Chief in 1999. He'll be helping to plan the event.

OA Representative?

What is an OA Troop/Team Representative?

The OA Troop/Team Representative program was begun in 1999, and is a program of the Order of the Arrow that has been officially adopted by the Boy Scouts of America. The OA Representative is now an official Troop/Team leadership position that counts toward completing the Star, Life, and Eagle requirements.

How does the Troop/Team Representative benefit his unit?

The Representative will be responsible to coordinate **service** within the unit, to coordinate unit involvement in the Order of the Arrow, including; Unit Elections, Camp Promotions, Inductions, and the ability to request Lodge and Chapter resources to help support the unit.

What's the job description for OA Representative?

- Serves as a communication link between the Lodge and the Unit
- Encourages Scout Camping in the Unit
- Encourages older Scouts to participate in high adventure programs
- Encourages Scouts to participate in Service
- Assists in troop skill training
- Encourages Arrowmen to stay active in the troop and to assume leadership positions
- Encourages all Arrowmen in the troop to seal their membership in the Order and to commit to serving their unit
- Sets a good Example
- Enthusiastically wears the scout uniform correctly
- Lives by the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and OA Obligation
- Shows Scout Spirit

What are the Qualifications to be an OA Representative?

- Under 18 years old
- Appointed by the SPL with SM approval
- OA Member in good standing (Dues Paid)
- They must register as a representative with the form provided at the Council Service Center

Does this position have a patch?

Yes, like all unit leadership positions, there is a shoulder patch that is available at your local Scout Shop or at any Scouting Supplier. The Patch can be seen above.

THE AAL-PA-TAH TROOP/TEAM REPRESENTATIVE PROGRAM

To better serve the local units of each Council, The Order of the Arrow as a whole has begun a program that will provide a link between Troops and Teams and the Lodge with which they are affiliated. This program was fully unveiled at the National Leadership Summit, which was held at Colorado State University this summer.

A similar program has been used in other Lodges throughout the country, but only now has it become a nationally recognized troop and team leadership position that counts for advancement to the ranks of Star, Life, and Eagle.

Aal-Pa-Tah 237 has already prepared a plan to get the program going within this next year. "I am committed to getting this program started and we will promote the heck out of it", says Stephen Brown, Lodge Chief of Aal-Pa-Tah.

Information can be found on the previous page regarding the Troop/Team Representative Program. If you would like to be a Troop or Team Representative for your

unit, talk to your Scout Master and Senior Patrol Leader. Tell them to look for information that is in the Kickoff Packet they received in August. A registration form must be filled out and mailed, following the instructions on the form, before the Lodge will be able to recognize and contact new Troop Representatives. That form is in this edition of Gator Tales and will be available at the Council Service Center. This program is just the beginning of the new focus for 2000.

FOCUS the great we scot Hor White Scot 2000

Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge is expanding. Youth leaders are growing. Scouting is evolving. With all of these changes, Aal-Pa-Tah sees a need to reorganize its efforts to serve the Gulf Stream Council. This change has been occurring for the past few years, but now is the time to bring it full swing. Now is the time to prepare for a new millennium of service. While the third millennium doesn't officially begin until AD 2001, we are starting

early to evolve to the higher level of greatness to which we are called as Scouting's National Honor Society. While much of the

new focus has yet to be drawn out, the gradual process starts now.

This new focus can best be divided into three parts:

Strong Communication

Aal-Pa-Tah will seek to provide several means of communication, starting with a refined and more useful newsletter, "Gator Tales". We will maintain a presence on the Internet at www.aal-patah.org. We will use the Troop Representative Program to communicate with the units that we serve.

Service

Aal-Pa-Tah will reaffirm its commitment to service to the Council, The Council Camps, and the local Units of the Council. The Troop Representative Program will serve to provide liaisons that can help the lodge realize how to better serve the Units. Service will not be limited to two weekends a year.

Brotherhood

The Lodge will seek to provide a fraternal atmosphere at all events. We will truly be an Honor Society that welcomes new members. Lodge weekends will be improved to allow for cheerfulness and fellowship to reign. Our admonition will be the code by which we operate.

These 3 points are the keys to the new focus that will guide Aal-Pa-Tah to the new Millennium.

THE HISTORY OF SCOUTING: THE 1930'S

1930

The Cub Scout program was formally launched; there were 5,102 Cub Scouts at the end of 1930. Scouts participated in the Oregon Trail Memorial Centennial. The Chief Scout Executive served as chairman of the committee on youth outside the home and school for President Hoover's White House Conference on Child Health and Protection. Scout circuses, merit badge exhibits, expositions, rallies, and other gatherings increased in number and scope. Membership, December 31, was 847,051. Total members to date, 5,249,350.

1931

At the 21st annual meeting held in Memphis, Tenn., Mortimer L. Schiff was elected president. Within a month of his election, Scout organizations throughout the world were saddened by his untimely death. Walter W. Head was elected to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Schiff. The divisional plan of organization was put into operation at the national office. The Sixth International Scout Conference was held near Vienna. The first Silver Beaver Awards were presented for distinguished service to boyhood within a council. Membership, December 31, was 878,358. Total members to date, 5,658,485.

1932

At the 22d annual meeting, the National Council adopted the 10-year program of growth-a plan to enroll one of every four 12year-old boys and keep them in Scouting for 4 years. To stimulate this effort, President Hoover presented awards to Scout units, councils, and regions reaching a specific standard for the year. Mrs. Jacob H. Schiff presented the Mortimer L. Schiff Scout Reservation at Mendham, N.J., in memory of her son. Work in emergency relief continued. There was strong development in troop camping under counciltrained leadership. Membership, December 31, 878,461. was Total members to 6,019,301.

1933

President Franklin D. Roosevelt became honorary president and former President Hoover, honorary vice-president. The Mortimer L. Schiff Scout Reservation was formally opened and dedicated. The Fourth

World Jamboree was held at Godollo, Hungary, with 21,000 Scouts from 46 countries and an American contingent of 406 Scouts and leaders. Membership, December 31, was 904,240. Total members to date, 6,389,551.

1934

In response to the request of President Roosevelt in a radio address delivered February 10, Boy Scouts performed a nationwide Good Turn, collecting 1,812,284 items of clothing, household furnishings, foodstuffs, and supplies for the distressed and needy. President Roosevelt announced a national jamboree would be held in Washington, D.C., in 1935. A strong program of cooperation was developed with the Catholic Church. Special emphasis was placed on the health program. The Order of the Arrow program was approved. Membership, December 31, was 973,589. Total members to date, 6,530,330.

1935

The entire Scout membership celebrated the Silver Jubilee of Scouting. For the first time, the membership passed the million mark. Observed as part of the 25th anniversary celebration: Boys' Life anniversary in March, ceremonies incident to the publication of the 5-millionth copy of the Handbook for Boys in April, the Silver Anniversary Meeting of the National Council in October, and Christmas holiday camps. The proposed national jamboree was canceled because of an infantile paralysis epidemic. Membership, December 31, was 1,027,833. Total members to date, 6,945,160.

1936

In a broadcast on February 8, President Roosevelt again invited the Scout membership to a national jamboree to be held in Washington in July 1937. The Sixth National Training Conference for Scout Executives was held at French Lick, Ind. The 26th annual meeting of the National Council took place at Atlantic City. In recognition of its health and safety programs, the American Children's Fund made a grant of \$100,000 to the Boy Scouts of America. The new Handbook for Scoutmasters was published. Membership, December 31, was 1,069,837. Total members to date, 7,376,961.

1937

The First National Jamboree was held in Washington from June 30 to July 9, at the invitation of President Roosevelt, with an attendance of 27,232 representing 536 councils. This was followed by the Fifth World Jamboree at Vogelenzang, Holland (attendance in the American contingent: 814), and the Ninth International Scout Conference. A retirement plan for professional leaders was adopted. Membership, December 31, was 1,129,841. Total members to date, 7,858,931.

1938

The national program emphasized Americanism and a rededication to the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence. A magnificent gift was made by Waite Phillips, a campsite known as Philturn Rockymountain Scoutcamp (later changed to Philmont Scout Ranch-see 1941) consisting of 35,857 acres of land on the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountain Continental Divide, near Cimarron, N.M. Scouts rendered unusual service in the New England hurricane and floods. The first grants from the Frank Phillips Foundation were made in Oklahoma and part of Texas to extend Scouting. Membership, December 31, 1,242,009. Total members to date, 8,399,923.

1939

Philturn Rockymountain Scoutcamp was opened for advanced Scout camping. Scouts participated in the Golden Gate Expo-


sition and at the New York World's Fair. A session of the 29th annual meeting was held at the New York World's Fair for a citizenship ceremony when a group of former Scouts who had just become 21 were formally received into citizenship by U.S. Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts. The 10th International Scout Conference was held in Edinburgh, Scotland. The Seventh National Training Conference for Scout Executives was held at Bretton Woods, N.H. The Boy Scouts of America was represented at the White House Conference on Youth in a Democracy by the Chief Scout Executive. Special experimental work with Scouting in less-chance areas was carried on through the Irving Berlin Fund. Membership, December 31, was 1,357,993. Total members to date, 8,977,696.

AAL-PA-TAH LODGE SELECTED TO HOST SECTION SEMINARS 2000

Recently, Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge beat out several other lodges for the opportunity to host the Section Seminars in November of 2000. Aal-Pa-Tah has never before had the opportunity to host this event, which is the largest training event of the year. Lodges from all over Florida and South Georgia will bring their members for intensive training in all areas of the Order, including Ceremonies, Native American Events and Lodge Operations.

Section Seminars were set up twenty five years ago to provide a weekend training opportunity for the section. It is also the site of the Council of Chiefs which will make decisions for the Section and approve the plan for the following Section Conference. In addition, the best patch trading of the year takes place at Section Seminars! A Pow-Wow takes place on Saturday night for the Native American enthusiasts. In recent years, a patch auction has also been added.

In preparation for this exciting opportunity, we are taking everyone who is interested to this year's Section Seminars in Valdosta, Georgia on the weekend of November 12-14, 1999. Our goal is to take a large contingent of youths and adults, so that they may see first hand what a Section Seminars is all about. The experiences gained by Aal-Pa-Tah arrowmen this year will be critical in making Section Seminars 2000 the best training event the Section has ever seen.

Aal-Pa-Tah Lodge has a great reputation for hosting section events. People still talk about the conferences that we hosted in 1997, 1988, 1981 and 1972. 


