“Adventure is out there!” exclaims famous fictional explorer Charles F. Muntz in Disney Pixar’s “UP!” “Never stop exploring!” reads ever little red North Face tag in each and every outdoor retailer. “Never give up your dreams of high adventure!” Guess who? If you attended the 1954 NOAC at the University of Wyoming, you would have heard our Founder Dr. Goodman end his closing address with:

The success of the Order depends on what each individual does in his making the Order of the Arrow ideals effective. To reach our goals of service, you must:

Never give up your dreams of high adventure.

Never give up your dream of great and distinct personal service.

Never give up your dream girl who can mean so much in your life.

Never give up your dreams of the infinite God.

If you keep all these dreams, then they will ultimately come true.

Dr. Goodman left us with a most excellent list of ideals. But notice he placed high adventure at the top. No doubt, not by accident. Through high adventure, who we are is whittled from what until then at which we could only guess. Our Troops and Crews teach us Scouting skills so that we shall use them. The two sticks you practiced lashing at a school on a Tuesday night are not sticks; they are paddles lashed together with a dining fly so you can sail Lake Saganaga at Northern Tier during a torrential downpour and three foot swells. The orienteering course you practiced at Tanah Keeta is not pieces of paper clipped to bushes and trees; it’s following your compass through a reef on a night-dive at Sea Base, not knowing what lies just beyond the beam of your headlamp. The leadership you learn as a member of the Lodge Executive Committee, is earned on the peaks at Philmont. This is why the National Order of the Arrow High Adventure (“OAHA”) programs exist - to provide Arrowmen with the greatest potential at reaching their dreams of high adventure, and so building the leaders of tomorrow.

For those of you not aware of the OAHA programs, please visit <http://adventure.oa-bsa.org/> and get informed. As of the writing of this article – November 22, 2009 – the remaining openings for the 2010 summer programs are: OAWV (107); OATC (146); and OAOA (44). In recent years, the programs have been mostly filling up by the New Year, and are generally completely full by February. This means now is the time to send in your application. Also, I sadly this week was made aware of a rumor that OAOA is being cancelled for the 2010 summer for unannounced reasons. Although not officially confirmed, this would mean that the 100+ Arrowmen currently signed up for OAOA will likely transfer over and take up a lot of the remaining OAWV and OATC slots. If you are thinking of fulfilling your dreams of high adventure, then now is the time to act.

Having spent five summers at Northern Tier participating in and staffing OAWV, the OA has already given me an average person's lifetime of adventure. Even so, I am not resting on those laurels. Food Service

It's hard to believe that Thanksgiving and Christmas have passed us already. This means only one thing: A new year is starting for Aal-Pa-Tah. It also means that your Kitchen Staff needs to come up with some new and exciting weekend menus. We rarely use the same menus twice except maybe for Breakfast. A Pow Wow, 2 Ordeal Weekends, Winter Fellowship, a Vigil Breakfast or two and maybe a makeup Ordeal. This is going to be a little story of what happens in the "Hunt for Food" for Lodge Weekends.

The very first thing is to find out who is going to be the Chairman for the weekend you are preparing. Talk to him and see if there is something that he wants. Then, pretty much do what you want to do.

Next step is to set a menu for that weekend, Friday night Cracker-barrel; Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner and a Cracker-barrel for Saturday and a Breakfast on Sunday. No small feat in itself. Also, plan this on a 90's budget.

Once you set your menu, get all your recipes together, you make a list of what you need right down to butter or salt. Now, you get out your suppliers catalog and look up their item number on everything you want. Sometimes your supplier does not sell what you want so you get to go back and reset your menu. When you get all this done, you get a little break.

On Wednesday before the Lodge Weekend, it starts to get crazy. You call Council and get the number of Brothers who have called in. Then you call the OA Staff Advisor and get a Purchase Order. Then you get together with your Advisor and apply the SWAG method to the number of attendees because usually about 18% to 25 % of attendees do not call in. You also have to figure in people who are at Camp giving service because you want to feed them. This is a good thing.

Once you have your number you figure out how much, to the nearest case, you have to order and now your order is almost ready. You also have to make sure it fits into your budget or its back to the menu and change. After that you have until 2PM on Thursday to get your order in for Friday delivery. Do not forget to call the Rangers and let them know it is coming.

Friday you get to camp and hope that all is well. You take inventory to make sure everything you ordered gets delivered. If you are short something, which happens, you get to go to the store and buy what you need.

So far, you have done quite a bit of work and have not even cooked anything.

Come to the weekends, have fun, give service, enjoy the fellowship and eat lots of good food. The kitchen Crew puts in a lot of time, sweat (hopefully not in the food) and energy to insure you have a lot of "Good Eats".

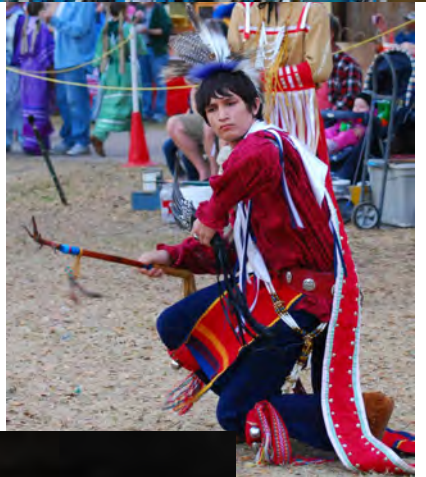

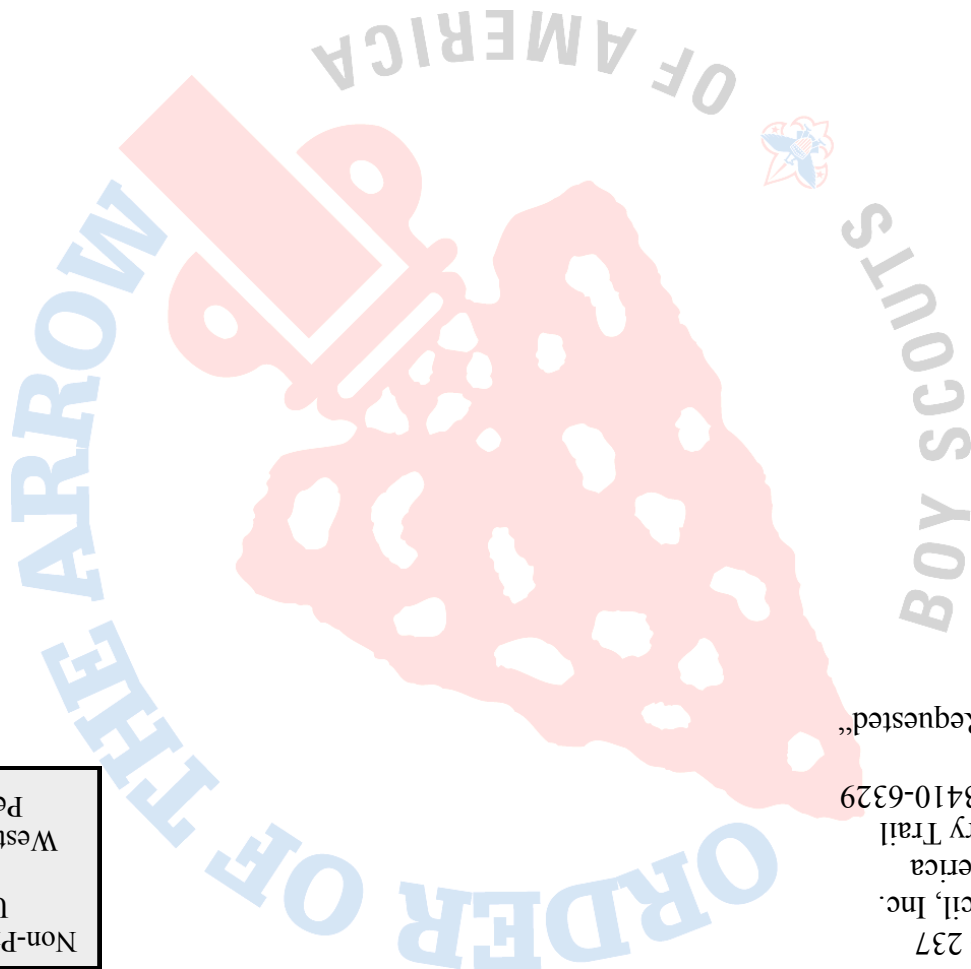
